If you cannot stand the heat, stay out of the dugout. Diehard Cub fans had been in their own baseball Hell for generations. But on a warm night in Cleveland, the Devil taunted them in a Game 7 for the Ages with heavenly highs and purgatory lows.

I saw the Cubs starting pitching matched up well against short rest Cleveland. The Cubs would start to hit a second time around. My only concern was whether Joe Maddon would overmanage games to cause defeat from victory. He was going to get new goat antlers if the Cubs did not pull out Game 7.

9. Pompous and arrogant demeanor.
